



It is particularly apt that we have chosen to celebrate our links with Scotland and Scottish music in tonight's concert as members of our traditional ensemble have recently returned from their own Scottish adventure!

We were delighted that the DkIT *Ceol Oirghialla* Traditional Music Ensemble were chosen to represent Ireland as a performing group at the International Society for Music Education conference which was held in Glasgow in July. This was a wonderful gathering of international music educators, researchers and practitioners and our students benefited from attending performances, conferences sessions and meeting with music educators and performers. It provided staff and students the opportunity to engage with music education on the world stage, highlighting the quality of education available in DkIT. Following their performance at ISME the group travelled north to Speyfest in Fochabers. This was a wonderful opportunity for our film students to work in this environment and a positive example of student collaborations. We are grateful for the support of the DkIT Research Office towards initiatives involving the practical application of research in our disciplines.

In the Department of Creative Arts, Media and Music we pride ourselves in our offering of creative and innovative programmes to students and aim to be a proactive centre of teaching and learning, research and performance. #### **Celebrating Our Scottish Adventure**

In July 2016, members of the DkIT Ceol Oirghialla Traditional Music Ensemble travelled to Scotland for a series of performances that included a performance at the National Piping Centre for the International Society for Music Education World Conference. It was the second time DkIT have been selected following their performances as Ireland's first ever performing group at the event in Brazil in 2014. The group also performed and facilitated workshops at Speyfest in Fochabers, which was this year celebrating 21 years.



As well as the performers, two undergraduate students on the BA (Hons) Film and Television Production, Hannah Conroy and John McCallig, accompanied the group to make a documentary to be broadcast this year. A special screening takes place this week as part of DkIT TradWeek.

#### Nótaí ar an gCeol

In the summer of 2016, staff and students from DkIT travelled to Scotland where they performed in The National Piping Centre in Glasgow and at Speyfest in Fochabers, where they encountered the rich musical traditions of our neighbouring nation, recognised much of what share. Tonight's concert celebrates our shared traditions and the links between them. The music is not all from an ancient past but has become part of a living and vibrant tradition that is part of our sound world.

The Year 4 Traditional Group open the concert with the great old reel, 'Lord Gordon's', which has been recorded by many leading figures in Irish traditional music. 'Fear a Bháta' (the boatman) is a Scots Gaelic song from the late 18<sup>th</sup> century, written by Sìne NicFhionnlaigh (Jean Finlayson) of Tong who was courting a young fisherman from Uig, Dòmhnall MacRath. The song captures the emotions that she endured during their courtship; they were married not long after she composed the song. Fiddle player Josephine Keegan was born in Dundee, Scotland and lived most of her life in South Armagh. Members of the ensemble visited the parks in Fochabers earlier this year and this tune and 'Captain Byng's' were published as reels in Scotland but are interpreted in the Irish tradition as polkas, the latter composed by Nathanial Gow (1763-1831) from Perthshire. The music of James Scott Skinner (1843-1927) from Aberdeenshire remains popular in both Scotland and Ireland, the first here a favourite of Donegal fiddler John Doherty (1900-1980). 'The Queen of Argyll' was written by Andy M. Stewart (1952-2015) and recorded by Silly Wizard on *Kiss The Tears Away* (1983). 'Pressed for Time' is a composition of innovative Scottish piper Gordon Duncan (1964-2005).

Year 2 students present 'Bonny Jean', attributed to Sligo-born Irish harper Thomas Connellan (*c*.1640-1720) who was a professional harper in Scotland. 'Dornoch Links' was composed around 1850 by Pipe Major John MacDonald MBE of the 79<sup>th</sup> Cameron Highlanders. 'The Earl of Moira' was Francis Rawdon-Hastings, 1<sup>st</sup> Marquis of Hastings born at Moira Co. Down. He sat for Randalstown in the Irish House of Commons from 1781 until 1783 and sat in the House of Lords from 1793. He was a long-standing advocate of Irish issues, in particular Catholic Emancipation, and was a patron of the poet Thomas Moore. The tune is ascribed to Duncan MacIntyre (*c*.1765-*c*.1807), a Scots dancing master living in London.

Year 3 students celebrate Calum MacLeod of the Island of Raasay who campaigned for many years to have a road built from Brochel Castle to Arnish, a distance of 1¾ miles to help keep their community alive. After several failed grant applications Calum decided to built the road himself and between 1964 and 1974 Calum built his road with a pick, shovel and wheelbarrow. Several year later the Council tarmaced his road but by this time Calum and his wife were the last inhabitants of Arnish. The tune 'Calum's Road' was composed by Donald Shaw of Capercaillie. 'The King's Shilling' by fiddle player Ian Sinclair from Caithness and 'Maggie' by contemporary Scottish singer-songwriter Lori Watson represent

new additions to the tradition. These are followed by a 6/8 pipe march composed by Katharine Marjory Stewart-Murray (1874-1960), who married the Marquess of Tullibardine, later 8<sup>th</sup> Duke of Atholl, John George Stewart-Murray (1871-1942). 'McKechnie's Farewell' was composed by accordion player John Somerville for Neil McKechnie on his retirement from Feis Rois after twenty years service. It is followed by a tune from Jock Morgan (1912-2007) from Kemnay, Aberdeenshire. 'Crooked Jack' was written by Irish songwriter Dominic Behan in 1965 to the air of 'The Star of the County Down', describing the hardship endured by the Irish and Scottish men while working on The Hydro Electric Plant at Inverary, Argill.

The first tunes from the *Ceol Oirghialla* Traditional Music Ensemble are reels and jigs with obvious Scottish links in their nomenclature. 'Roslin Castle', named after an important church outside Edinburgh, was probably composed by Scottish composer James Oswald (1711-1769) but is sourced here to Pádraigín Ní hUallacháin's collection *The Hidden Ulster* and is a tune from a manuscript of Patrick McGahon of Dungooley, Co. Louth. It is followed by two jigs from *The Speyside Fiddler*, James Alexander MBE, the director of Speyfest. 'Welcome Home Royal Charlie' is found in the repertoire of Donegal musicians including John Doherty. It possibly refers to Charles Edward Stuart, 'Bonnie Prince Charlie' (1720-1788), the instigator of the unsuccessful Jacobite uprising of 1745. 'Farewell to Whiskey' was reputedly composed by Neil Gow (1727-1807) in 1799 during a failure in the Scottish barley crop.

Before we close the night, we invite you to join us in some well known songs that have been popularised by Irish and Scottish folk singers. Although often thought to be Scottish, 'Wild Mountain Thyme' is a reworking of an older song 'The Braes o' Balquhidder', by the Scottish poet Robert Tannahill (1774-1810), by Belfast piper Francis McPeake. It is followed by a song from Robert 'Rabbie' Burns (1758-1796) from 1794 and one from Dougie MacLean written in 1977. We finish with two more great reels from piper Gordon Duncan in the style of a Scottish ceilidh stomp.
